COUNTY UNIT SYSTEM IN GEORGIA

Each of the 159 counties in the state was classified as urban, town, or rural according to their population. The 8 most populous counties (urban) received six unit votes each, the next 30 most populous (town) received four, and the remaining 121 (rural) received two. The disproportionate distribution of unit votes to population size encouraged heavy campaigning in the rural counties.
